About the Book

Why is this book, and how is it different?

The primary reason for writing this book is to express concerns about the prevalence of wars, particularly in the Middle East. I have experienced conflict firsthand in Syria and Iraq for much of my early life, and subsequently, living in the United States, I have the sentiment of war fatigue shared by many around the world. In this book, I advocate for a shift in focus toward peace. Despite the pervasive influence of interests in international relations and the complexity of the geopolitical landscape in the Middle East, the cost of achieving and sustaining peace is significantly lower than the devastating toll of war.

I have written two books in Arabic about the United States and the Middle East in the last seven years. These are best translated as: "The United States and the Evolving Events in the Middle East: The Geostrategic Global Revelry and the New World Order," which was released in mid-2022, that builds upon a previous book, "Obama Departing and the Middle East in Flames," published on January 1, 2017, just three weeks before President Obama left the White House. This book, "As the Sand Shifts," is the best translation and updated extensive summary of the last Arabic edition. It delves into the complex dynamics of U.S. involvement in the Middle East since World War II. It focuses on five principal issues: The Arab-Israeli conflict, Iran's Nuclear Program and its influence in the region, the Russian Challenge, the Completion with China, and the international and regional conflict in Syria.

Through a strategic planning lens, I address four key questions related to these issues: Where are we, how did we get here, where are we heading, and how do we navigate forward?

Using a social science perspective and employing a scholarly approach, I analyze historical events using principles from geography, history, economics, and politics. Rather than merely recounting past events, I aim to anticipate future challenges and propose strategic approaches. The book underwent rigorous peer review by experts in political science to ensure comprehensive analysis and accuracy.

The Middle East is the most significant geostrategic region in the world, historically shaped by global powers. The United States has been the sole dominant power in the Middle East for over three decades since the end of the Cold War. Today, challenges from Russia demand a fresh perspective beyond the outdated strategies of the Cold War. By understanding past mistakes and adopting a forward-thinking approach, the United States can successfully navigate the Middle East's complexities and safeguard America's position on the world stage.

As an American Citizen with roots in the Middle East, I am concerned about the current situation there and the status of the United States not only on the world stage but also here in the country. I hope this book finds its way to as many readers as possible, which will be my biggest reward. Books are written to be read. Otherwise, as the Chinese proverb says, "A closed book is nothing but a pile of paper."

In doing so, he offers many valuable insights, the most important of which is that in order to understand US foreign policy, one must first pay attention to domestic politics. More specifically, the decisions of US Presidents who play an outsized role in dictating the course of foreign policy. Zeroing in on President Obama's initiatives, Aisami extends his evaluation into the Trump administration, as well as into the actions of the current Biden presidency.
